#### **Chronic Absenteeism**

Pirate Family! The high school staff is going through a deep dive of learning with Grantwood AEA staff. We have been looking at the scores from ISASP in Math and English, Post Secondary Readiness, ACT scores, and absenteeism at AHS. It has been a valuable experience and it will make our school even better in the future.

The biggest surprise to our team was the information on chronic absenteeism at Alburnett High School. The definition of absenteeism is defined as missing 10 percent or more of school days for any reason, excused or unexcused absences. For example, a student watching the Pirates at state wrestling with their parents for three days will fall into a chronic absenteeism count. It seems odd that a student with their parents would fall into this category, but this is the regulation from the lowa Department of Education. AHS must follow this guidance so we will look into ways to improve our chronic absenteeism data.

In looking at our chronic absenteeism data from 2023, the Alburnett High School is at 18.9% of our total student population being identified in this category. This would be 44 students out of 233 in the high school that missed 10% of the school days for the school year 2023. In comparison, the state of lowa is at 25.6% for students missing 10% of the school days. AHS obviously wants our students in school so having 18.9% is too many students out of school.

In the future, Alburnett High School and our stakeholders will need to make adjustments to make sure we are not having chronically absent students. We will use the lowa Department of Education for a resource along with clearly communicating with parents and students about absences. It will be a learning experience for all and we will work with you as much as possible with absences in the future.


In sports, when talking about a season, coaches often talk about finishing strong and peaking at the right time. We want athletes to make sure they are at their best when it matters. We want them to be mentally and physically ready as playoffs begin and championships are to be won. At Alburnett Middle School, we want to take the same approach to the end of our "season" or school year. We want our students to be at their peak as we approach an important time in their academic career. In late March and early April we will begin taking our state mandated tests, the Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress or ISASP. This test helps us see what students know and are able to do when it comes to the standards we teach. It is important feedback for teachers, parents, and students. For teachers, it helps us adjust curriculum and planning to make sure we are teaching students the required standards in a way they understand. For parents and students, it is one measure of a student's growth and preparedness.



As we move toward ISASP time and knowing we want students to "peak" I am hoping we can work together to help students be at their best. At school, we are starting to do some ISASP practice during advisory so that students know what to expect when taking the tests. We are working especially on the writing portion as that tends to be the section that most students struggle with. We are also beginning to talk with students about their scores and set growth goals with them to help them have a more focused approach to the tests.

We need your help making sure students are in attendance in school and are getting good sleep and nutrition at home. We also need your assistance in helping them understand the importance of doing their best work and giving their best effort. If students truly give their best effort, we as a school staff, truly understand what students know and are able to do and can help support them individually or as a group with that information.

If we work together we can ensure our students are at their best at the right time and finishing strong!



# **Buzzing with Reading**

Our elementary has been buzzing with reading this year with a new curriculum and staff working tirelessly to support all learners in their quest to read. A healthy literacy block for students includes work on decoding words, phonemic awareness, fluency, vocabulary, comprehension, oral language, and writing. That's a lot to pack in! We are often asked what families can do from home to support this effort, and it comes down to this: reading with your child does wonders!

#### Curling up with a good book and a family member creates an enjoyment for reading that is hard to replicate here at school.

Students wanting to read establishes a foundation that our literacy instruction builds on. Even if the adult is the reader, the student is working on their oral language, comprehension, and vocabulary skills in the process. Pointing out words your child may recognize and showing students how you break down a word to find meaning can only reinforce their learning.

Our local libraries have a wide selection of books and many fun activities to get in on during a visit! With some of our families heavily involved in extracurricular activities, carving in the time to read might sound daunting. Reading can also be done on billboards, menus, programs, street signs, and books in the car.

Reading is critical to all of the things our students will grow up to do and be, and we are grateful for the partnerships with you at home to support every learner. Is your child avoiding reading? Talk with your child's teacher for some more ideas to get started!



# Preparation for Transition to High School from Middle School

I can't believe we are already in March! The school year has flown by.

This is the time of the year where I start working with my 8th grade students on getting ready for High School. This year I revamped the Guidance class to center around prepping for High School. During this time, students have been able to research potential careers they are interested in, learn about finances and how to make good financial decisions (needs vs. wants), reading & writing emails, utilizing google calendar and so much more.

The biggest thing we do in this class are the students' 4 year plans for High School. We use My Academic Plan to create a rough draft of their potential classes throughout their 4 years of high school. If your student has taken my class already, this hard copy should have been brought home, looked over, signed and returned to me. If your student hasn't had me yet, keep an eye out for that in the coming months! This is an exciting, but scary time for students as it is a big transition. There are a lot of different classes to pick from, like foods and baking, computer science, or even industrial tech classes. Luckily Mrs. Tull, the High School Counselor, comes to ease some minds and spends a few days with us answering any high school related questions students may have.

I am so excited to see the 8th grade students' journey through high school and to see all the good they are going to do!

#### **Every Learner, Every Day**

Reflecting back on the coach goals for our Teacher Leadership Program (Listen to learn, Use data to make decisions, and Build teacher capacity around the Four Questions) is part of our collaborative process throughout the year. This reflection process guides our work supporting teachers and students. As we think about where we are and where we want to be, there are always challenges that arise.

Overcoming different challenges sparks inquiry. Our staff has had the opportunity to learn from Ken Williams, a nationally-recognized trainer, speaker, coach and consultant in leadership and school culture. Williams challenges us to be ruthless in mission to ensure that each student meets the essential outcomes set forth in our classrooms. Every student brings a different challenge to the classroom. Our Inquiry Cycle Process is used to assist teachers in how we help every student meet the essential outcomes in our classrooms. Ken Williams brings this to light as well, fueling the inquiry cycle in overcoming the challenge of how we will get every student there. When we know what is essential, we know where we are going, and we work collaboratively to get there.

At the time of this writing, the coach team has spent 32,064 minutes across 1,185 interactions with teachers connecting and working collaboratively with teachers through the Inquiry Cycle Process. As coaches, we reflect on our essentials within our coach goals and support teachers through the Inquiry Cycle Process. We work authentically through our mission statement. We also work alongside teachers engaging in the Professional Learning Community process as they collaborate daily. When we look through the lens of what is essential and what challenges we must overcome, we ask ourselves these types of questions: What are the essential learning outcomes? Have we produced those outcomes? How are we getting every student to the outcome and possibly beyond the outcome? These questions drive collaboration and push our coaching team in meeting our goal of supporting teachers and their students. "High levels of learning" means that everyone gets to the essential learning outcome. This is ensured when we are ruthless in our collective work together.
